
HIGHLIGHTS

- More than two months into the ceasefire, food access has significantly improved, allowing a substantial scale-up of food
 assistance, commercial flows, and operational reach across Gaza. WFP operations and its distribution networks are fully
 restored across the Strip. For the first time since the escalation, WFP's entire humanitarian portfolio is back in motion—
 representing a substantial recovery of ground lost earlier in the conflict post the January/February 2025 ceasefire.
- In Gaza, WFP reached 1.1 million people in October and 1.8 million in November, delivering a mix of food parcels, wheat flour, bread, hot meals, nutritional supplements and digital payments—marking two consecutive months of million-plus coverage. However, despite improved food access, inflows of food, medical supplies and shelter items remain well below what is needed to stabilize the humanitarian situation, with consistency and scale still lacking.
- Despite full operational readiness, persistent access restrictions, inconsistent procedures, and sudden changes across all corridors continue to put at risk all the progress made this period. Sustained ceasefire adherence and predictable, unhindered humanitarian access are essential to keep food moving into Gaza.



SITUATION UPDATE

- On 10 December, the Allenby/King Hussein Bridge crossing reopened for Gaza, reflecting broader diplomatic efforts to facilitate humanitarian access and delivery. support increased aid Nevertheless, movements are limited to Back-to-Back convoys carrying food commodities only, while Government-to-Government convoy modality remains halted. Expanding access and increasing convoy capacity is critical to meet urgent humanitarian needs. The crossing had been closed following a security incident in September involving a Jordanian aid driver, after which aid trucks were no longer permitted to use the route. The prolonged closure further constrained humanitarian access, particularly as the Allenby/King Hussein Bridge is a key corridor between Jordan and the West Bank.
- On 8 December, the Secretary General <u>strongly</u> <u>condemned</u> the unauthorized entry of Israeli police <u>into the UNRWA headquarters in East Jerusalem</u>, removing UN property, and replacing the UN flag with the

Israeli flag. The incident has also prompted expressions of concern and condemnation from various international actors.

 A winter storm affected Gaza since 10 December, bringing heavy rains, strong winds, high seas, and thunderstorms. The severe weather is likely to further impact tens of thousands of displaced families living in tents and makeshift shelters, potentially causing additional damage and worsening already difficult humanitarian conditions.

PROGRAMME UPDATE (1-7 December)



 In the first week of December, WFP reached over 170,600 people with food parcels and wheat flour, distributing assistance through 59 active distribution points across Gaza. Due to the limitations of supplies, WFP provided reduced rations – 75 percent of the full entitlement, equivalent to two food parcels and one wheat flour bag per household – to reach as many people as

- possible. Sustained and increased supply inflows remain critical for further scale-up.
- Forty-three community kitchens are operational across the Strip: 17 in the south, 11 in the middle area, and 15 in the north, serving an estimated 340,000 meals per day. The scale-up of additional kitchens continues.
- WFP's 19 operational bakeries, including eight in the north, currently produce over 181,000 bread bundles per day (2 kg each). All bread is provided either for free or at a subsidized price (ILS 3, < USD 1) through 122 contracted retailers. In December, WFP will expand to additional retailers, supporting a gradual shift from free distribution through partners to subsidized sales.

Malnutrition Assistance in Gaza

- A total of eleven WFP partners are now actively delivering nutrition services. **WFP** provided malnutrition-prevention assistance to 63,630 pregnant and breastfeeding women/girls and children under five across 105 active sites. In parallel, treatment services reached over 2,000 pregnant and breastfeeding women/girls at 54 sites.
- In collaboration with UNICEF, UNRWA, and the Education Cluster, WFP provided fortified nutritious snacks to nearly 192,000 children - surpassing the monthly target of 120,000 - in 238 active Temporary Learning Spaces (TLS) in shelters.



Digital Payments in Gaza

The distribution of WFP's digital transfers is set for mid-December, with a target of 300,000 people.



General Food Assistance in the West Bank

- More than 107,600 people received emergency food vouchers under the shock response plan, while the regular voucher programme assisted nearly 167,600 vulnerable people.
- Through WFP's First 1,000 Days Programme, 34 women received cash top-ups to meet higher nutritional needs. In Area C, 10,700 Bedouins and herders received food vouchers and over 5,100 were supported with in-kind
- Additionally, eight Gazan workers stranded in the West Bank continued to receive regular cash assistance.



SUPPLY CHAIN

- Sustained access constraints across all corridors continue to limit WFP's ability to operate at scale, despite full operational readiness. The cumulative impact of restrictions, sudden procedural changes, and inconsistent mechanisms are now putting the continuity of General Food Distributions (GFD) in Gaza at risk.
- Following a temporary increase in scanning throughput at Ashdod Port in late November, operations were again suspended due to a scanner malfunction, halting cargo movements. With no alternative scanning option available, WFP cargo continues to face delays.
 - Repeated cancellations of WFP-manifested humanitarian trucks in favor of commercial cargo from the West Bank, combined with ongoing procedural changes at West Bank crossings, have made operational planning highly unpredictable and are affecting fleet utilization, dispatch sequencing, and delivery timelines.

Inside Gaza, uplifts from the Kerem Shalom/Karam Abu Salem (KS) crossing continue to be routed exclusively via the coastal road, which remains heavily congested and exposes movements to significant operational and security risks. WFP continues to advocate for the reopening of the Salah Ad-Din Road to enable a faster and more reliable route for humanitarian deliveries.

CLUSTERS AND COMMON SERVICES



Food Security Sector (FSS)

- As of 6 December, 1.5 million meals were prepared and delivered daily by 26 partners in 206 community kitchens.
- Around 3,500 veterinary kits entered Gaza on 5 December, the first such delivery since August 2024. These kits will help improve animal health, protect herding livelihoods, and support vector control by addressing ectoparasite infestations, which remain a significant public health concern. The sector continues to promote the One Health approach, emphasizing the interconnectedness of human, animal, and environmental health.



1 Logistics Cluster (<u>LC</u>)

- The Logistics Cluster team was granted access to the Gaza crossing platforms - starting with KS - to support partners with improved stock visibility and logistics oversight.
- A total of 1,356 trucks were manifested for 16 partners, with 989 (73 percent) offloaded at Gaza crossings.
- The Logistics Cluster facilitated the collection of 2,421 pallets of aid from Gaza entry points on behalf of partners and received 40 m³ of aid on behalf of two partners in common warehouses inside Gaza.
- The West Bank route remains constrained by shifting requirements causing delays, rejections, and higher costs.
- The Allenby Bridge partially reopened after its closure on 18 September, initially to commercial trucks and subsequently also to limited humanitarian commodities (food only). The first WFP crossing took place on 10 December, one day after the authorization of food shipments was communicated on 9 December.
- Back-to-Back (B2B) convoys continue via Sheikh Hussein Bridge - Jordan River, though capacity remains very limited. Four B2B convoys for three partners were facilitated, with 30 trucks offloaded at Gaza crossings.
- The Egypt route remains restricted, with authorizations via Nitzana limited to 40 trucks/day, compounded by frequent returns at KS.

Emergency Telecommunications Cluster (ETC)

- In 2025, the ETC and UNDSS delivered Basic Security Communications training to a total of 43 personnel across five UN agencies strengthening their skills in effective communication during field missions, with additional sessions planned.
- On 05 December, the ETC, in collaboration with UNDSS and UNRWA, initiated relocating the Very High Frequency (VHF) repeater from the WFP guest house in Deir Al Balah to the UNRWA Khan Yunis Training Center (KYTC), aiming to enhance VHF coverage in southern Gaza. Installation at KYTC is still underway.
