



WFP Afghanistan Situation Report

21 November 2022

In Numbers

19.9 million people – nearly half of the population – are projected to be acutely food insecure between November 2022 and March 2023, according to preliminary estimates

4.7 million children, pregnant and lactating women at risk of acute malnutrition in 2022; 3.9 million children are acutely malnourished

All 34 provinces are facing crisis or emergency levels of acute food insecurity

Highlights

- In November, WFP has assisted 3.5 million¹ people so far with emergency food, nutrition, and livelihood support. Distributions are ongoing to reach 15 million beneficiaries this month.
- To date, WFP has successfully prepositioned **79,012 mt** of food assistance across the country ahead of the winter season.
- WFP urgently requires USD 1.46 billion to sustain operations through May 2023, with severe shortfalls beginning in January. As the winter period approaches, more than 6 million people in IPC Phase 4, teeter on the brink of famine, and require urgent humanitarian support to avoid catastrophic levels of hunger.

Situation Update

- An estimated 19.9 million people in Afghanistan are acutely food-insecure (IPC 3+), according to preliminary projections for November 2022 to March 2023.² Populations in 12 provinces are estimated to be experiencing IPC Phase 4 (Emergency) conditions during the winter lean season. WFP awaits the official endorsement of an updated IPC Analysis for this period.
- Afghanistan continues to face the highest prevalence of insufficient food consumption globally, Results from a special edition of the monthly WFP Food Security Update showed that, on average, 92 percent of household income is spent on food, while 51 percent of households rely on coping strategies to meet their basic food needs. Nine in ten households (90 percent) continue to face insufficient food consumption.
- Female-headed households are disproportionately affected, as 96 percent are facing insufficient food consumption amid restrictions on women and girls. Female heads of household are twice as likely to sacrifice their meals so that their families can eat, compared to maleheaded households.
- Record high fuel prices continue to impact transportation costs across Afghanistan, resulting in an increase in the national average price of basic food commodities and localized food prices in remote areas. While an increased supply of diesel is expected to lower transportation prices in the coming weeks, prices remain far higher than a year ago.

WFP Response

- So far in November, WFP assisted 3.5 million people in Afghanistan with emergency food, nutrition, and livelihood support. It aims to reach 15 million people this month.
- The Salang Pass experienced its first closure of this winter season. The movement of trucks was halted for one day due to poor winter weather conditions. The Salang Pass is a key transport corridor that connects Kabul to northern provinces in Afghanistan and is often impassible during the winter season, impacting the delivery of assistance to remote areas.
- WFP has prepositioned 79,012 mt of food in hardto-reach areas during the winter season. Its goal is 100,000 mt to feed 1.5 million people.
- WFP assisted several flood-affected families in Badakhshan province, after heavy rains destroyed homes, infrastructure, and livelihoods between 7-8 November. Affected communities risk particularly heightened levels of vulnerability as winter weather sets in.
- School feeding activities resumed in all areas affected by temporary suspensions, after successful negotiations with de facto authorities.
- WFP has partnered with the World Health
 Organization (WHO) and UNICEF to deliver an
 annual school-based deworming campaign for
 school-aged children across all 34 provinces in
 Afghanistan.

Food and Nutrition Assistance

- General Food Assistance: Thus far, in November, WFP has assisted more than 3.1 million people with emergency food and nutrition support, including 2.5 million people with in-kind food assistance, 300,000 people with direct cash or value vouchers, and more than 120,000 people with commodity vouchers.
- Nutrition: In November, WFP provided specialized nutritious foods to 213,500 women and children for the prevention of malnutrition, and 222,000 women and children for the treatment of existing cases. WFP supports more than 2,200 health centers and 421 mobile health and nutrition teams (MHNTs) across the country to ensure continued and equitable access to nutrition assistance in hard-to-reach areas.
- School feeding: In November, WFP provided nutritious mid-day snacks to 331,000 primary school students, of which 181,0000 primary school girls also received take-home rations of vegetable oil. WFP has also provided cash incentives to more than 11,120 secondary school girls in four provinces (Balkh, Jawzjan, Sar-e-Pul, and Zabul) where they are permitted to attend school.
- Asset creation and livelihoods: In In November, WFP assisted 70,000 people through food assistance for assets (FFA) programming and 1,400 people through food assistance for training (FFT) activities. WFP held 15 Seasonal Livelihood Programming (SLP) workshops for community representatives from different districts, NGOs, UN agencies, and relevant stakeholders on gender and livelihoods, vulnerabilities and shocks, and opportunities to improve collaboration throughout the year. Another five SLP workshops are scheduled in the coming weeks.



Supply Chain and Logistics

- During the reporting period, WFP dispatched 28,655
 MT of mixed food commodities to its cooperating partners, representing 41 percent of the monthly plan.
- WFP has received 97 percent of fertilizer for the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations (FAO) under its service agreement. More than 37,486 MT has been transported by WFP commercial transporters to FAO implementing partners.
- WFP is contracting six additional transport companies to support operations in Hairatan, pending the finalization of agreements.



UN Humanitarian Air Service (UNHAS)

- UNHAS operates flights to 27 destinations, including 23 domestic destinations and four airbridges that connect Kabul to Islamabad, Dushanbe, Dubai, and Doha.
- UNHAS has conducted 3,720 flights in 2022 so far, transporting 24,069 passengers (16,863 on domestic and 7,206 on international flights), including transportation of nine medevac patients and 50.42 MT of humanitarian light cargo (medical equipment, medicine vaccine, and office supply).

Resourcing Update

- WFP faces a net funding shortfall of US\$1.46 billion to sustain operations over the next six months (December 2022 – May 2023).
- Food, nutrition, and UNHAS requirements were included in the Global Humanitarian Overview and OCHA Flash Appeal for Afghanistan.
