In Numbers

22.8 million people – half of the population – will face acute food insecurity from November 2021,¹ including 8.7 million at risk of famine-like conditions

3.2 million children and 700,000 pregnant and lactating women currently at risk of acute malnutrition

All 34 provinces are facing crisis or emergency levels of acute food insecurity

Highlights

- WFP aims to meet the food and nutrition needs of more than 23 million people in 2022.² To meet the task at hand, WFP estimates it would require US\$ 220 million per month.
- WFP has reached around 5 million people in December so far, and a total of around 15 million people in 2021.³ This is 6 million more than 2020.
- WFP has prepositioned food in strategic areas where heavy snows can cut off communities from assistance.

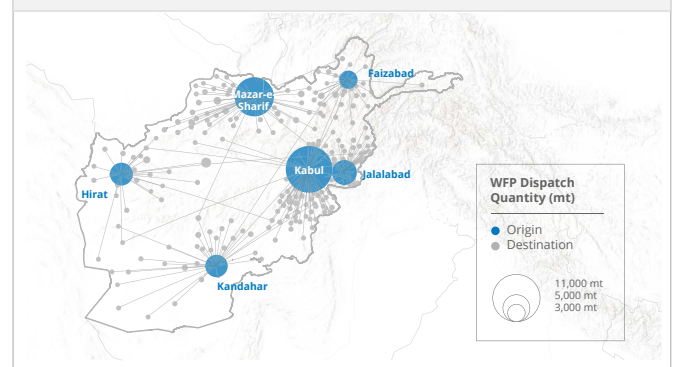
Situation Update

- **The economic crisis continues spiralling, with the value of the Afghani against the US dollar remaining at record lows.** Prices for fuel and staple food items continued to rise—wheat flour and fuel are nearly 50 percent higher than in the last week of June 2021 ([WFP Market Monitor](#)). Average household debt is now [reportedly](#) more than four times the average monthly income.
- **Acute malnutrition continues deteriorating:** In the face of inaction, more than half of all children under five (3.9 million), and over 800,000 pregnant and lactating women (PLW) could be at risk of suffering from acute malnutrition in 2022.
- **More than half of the population** face crisis (IPC Phase 3) or emergency (IPC Phase 4) levels of food insecurity, according to the latest Integrated Food Security Phase Classification (IPC) [report](#). This is the highest number of acutely food insecure people ever recorded in Afghanistan and is among the highest levels of acute food insecurity worldwide.
- **An alarming 98 percent of Afghans are facing insufficient food consumption,** according to WFP's latest [survey](#): 17 percentage points more than early August.
- **More than half of the population (55 percent) are resorting to drastic measures to feed their families,** such as buying smaller quantities of food, borrowing food, and eating less nutritious food. This is five times the number before 15 August.

WFP Response

- WFP is scaling up its efforts to assist more than 23 million people in 2022. As the economic crisis worsens, WFP is adapting and ramping up cash-based transfers, particularly in urban areas, to help in sustaining the local economy and keeping markets functional.
- WFP has supported around 15 million beneficiaries so far in 2021—over 6 million more than in all of 2020. Since August, the number of beneficiaries reached by WFP each month has steadily increased, with around 5 million people reached so far in December.
- WFP's staff and partners deliver food and nutrition assistance to all 34 provinces to meet humanitarian needs, support women and girls, prevent and treat malnutrition, encourage school attendance, and boost community resilience.

Food and Nutrition Assistance

- **General Food Assistance:** WFP has assisted around 13 million beneficiaries with unconditional resource transfers in 2021, including over 4.5 million so far in December.
- **School feeding:** In 2021, WFP has reached over 200,000 primary and secondary school children and plans to reach 1 million from 2022. In 28 of 34 provinces, all school grades are on a three-month winter break, while primary school for girls and boys continues in the remaining provinces.
- **Nutrition:** In 2021, WFP has assisted over half a million pregnant and lactating women and over 1 million children under five with malnutrition prevention and treatment activities. WFP is treating moderate acute malnutrition by integrating with mobile health and nutrition teams in the most remote locations of the country. WFP is scaling up its support to reach hundreds of thousands more beneficiaries in the coming months.
- **Internally Displaced Persons:** In 2021, WFP has assisted over 600,000 internally displaced persons (IDP).
- **COVID-19:** WFP has reached more than 900,000 people affected by the socio-economic impact of the pandemic in 2021.
- **Asset creation and livelihoods:** WFP's food assistance for assets and vocational skills training (VST) activities continue across the country; WFP has reached over 200,000 beneficiaries in 2021, and will be scaling up its planned reach in 2022.



Supply Chain and Logistics

- In the past week (12-18 December), WFP distributed 15,464 mt of food stocks to 138 locations.
- With 170 trucks currently operational, WFP is increasing its fleet of trucks and trailers in the coming months to increase deliveries.



UN Humanitarian Air Service (UNHAS)

- UNHAS has conducted 804 flights, transporting 4,455 passengers since flights resumed on 28 August for humanitarian workers and essential cargo. On 16 December, UNHAS conducted an inaugural flight from Kabul to Doha, followed by a return flight on 19 December, as part of the reopening of the airbridge.
- Deteriorating weather conditions and the absence of navigation aids are anticipated to disrupt flights in the coming weeks, particularly if the inadequacies in air traffic services are not addressed.
- UNHAS now reaches 22 of 34 provinces.

Resourcing Update

- WFP has borrowed internally to expedite food deliveries and urgently requests that all pledges be confirmed to meet mounting needs.
- On 20 December, US\$ 8 million was [announced](#) from the Republic of Korea to support WFP emergency operations.
- To meet increasing needs in 2022, WFP estimates it could require US\$ 220 million per month.
- Following 15 August, WFP appealed for urgent funds to meet needs until the end of 2021; it has now received over US\$ 420 million.

<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ALL 34 PROVINCES COVERED BY WFP ASSISTANCE 22.8 MILLION PEOPLE FACING ACUTE FOOD INSECURITY 	<p>AFGHANISTAN PROGRAMME OVERVIEW</p> <p>WFP is ramping up assistance for 23 million women, men and children in Afghanistan in 2022 with the aim of averting famine and a humanitarian disaster.</p> <p>Emergency Food Assistance The hunger crisis is unfolding at a rapid speed, with over half of Afghanistan's population of 40 million now facing acute food insecurity—the highest number the humanitarian community has ever seen in the country. WFP is responding with an unprecedented scale-up of its emergency food assistance to over 21 million people facing emergency or high levels of acute food insecurity in 2022. This includes urban populations, who are for the first time suffering from food insecurity at similar rates to rural communities.</p> <p>Prevention & Treatment of Acute Malnutrition Half of all children under five—around 3.2 million—are expected to suffer from acute malnutrition this winter. WFP has assisted around a million children under five, and around half a million pregnant and lactating women so far in 2021 with malnutrition prevention and treatment activities across all 34 provinces. WFP is extending its nutrition reach into remote areas of 24 provinces through support for over 120 mobile health and nutrition teams. In 2022, WFP will reach 4.8 million with a malnutrition prevention package, and 1.6 million children under five and PLW with treatment for acute malnutrition as part of its emergency food assistance.</p> <p>School Feeding WFP's school feeding programmes continue in the current context, reaching over 200,000 children so far in 2021, including primary school children with school meals or take-home rations, and secondary school girls with cash-based transfers. WFP plans to scale up these programmes to reach 1 million children in 2022.</p>
<p>Asset Creation and Livelihoods</p> <p>Work opportunities are shrinking, with most households now reporting just one day of work per week. This comes on top of the worst drought in years, which is especially concerning for the 85 percent of the population who rely on agriculture for livelihoods. WFP integrates two types of programmes into its work to support long-term resilience for individuals and communities. Through food assistance for assets activities, WFP provides participants with dignified livelihood opportunities, which build or boost productive assets in their communities (like irrigation canals or roads), while simultaneously meeting the immediate food needs of their families with food or cash assistance. Through vocational skills training activities, WFP supports participants with food or cash assistance while teaching new skills such as auto or mobile phone repair, gardening, fish farming, or carpet weaving. In 2022, WFP is scaling up these programmes to reach over a million beneficiaries.</p> <p>Market Access and Sustainable Food Systems</p> <p>Local markets are a primary source of food for many families. WFP works to link livelihood programming to local value chains by continually expanding its food systems work to increase production of nutritious foods. WFP prioritizes the full participation of women in value chain activities such as involvement in gardening, food processing, marketing and other opportunities.</p>
