



WFP Afghanistan Situation Report

23 June 2022

In Numbers

18.9 million people – nearly half of the population – are estimated to be acutely food insecure between June-November 2022

4.7 million children, pregnant and lactating women at risk of acute malnutrition in 2022; 3.9 million children are acutely malnourised

All 34 provinces are facing crisis or emergency levels of acute food insecurity

Highlights

- WFP has assisted 4.3 million people thus far in June. WFP plans to reach 23 million people in 2022.¹
- On 22 June, a <u>5.9 magnitude earthquake</u> struck Paktika and Khost provinces, killing more than 1,000 people and destroying hundreds of homes. While vulnerability assessments take place, WFP is distributing High Energy Biscuits to affected populations and prepositioning mobile storage units. On 23 June, WFP deployed 170 MT of food for 2,600 households as an initial response.

Situation Update

- In addition to the deadly earthquake on 22
 June, flash floods have destroyed homes and
 livelihoods in at least four provinces following
 heavy rains on 21 June. WFP is awaiting the results
 of ongoing vulnerability assessments to determine
 if emergency response is needed.
- A total of 18.9 million people in Afghanistan are currently acutely food insecure (IPC 3+), according to the May 2022 IPC Analysis, including 6 million in IPC Phase 4 (Emergency), and 13 million in IPC Phase 3 (Crisis). Continued humanitarian assistance in Ghor province is needed to deter IPC Phase 5 (Catastrophe) conditions, which affected some 20,000 people between March and May.
- In Afghanistan, 92 percent of the population faces insufficient food consumption, while 57 percent of households resort to crisis-level coping strategies to get by, according to WFP's latest <u>Food</u> <u>Security Update: Round Nine</u> (May 2022).
- Recurrent drought and erratic climatic shocks are expected to result in a below average harvest in Afghanistan. This threatens to further compound the current food insecurity crisis.
 FEWSNET data shows that dry weather conditions have already resulted in reduced crop yields during the current harvest season, particularly in north and north-eastern rainfed regions.

WFP Response

- Thus far in June, WFP has reached 4.3 million people in Afghanistan with food, nutrition, and livelihoods support. WFP is scaling down from plans to reach 18 million people each month, to 10 million people in each of the summer months between June and September, in line with the post-harvest season and limited resources.
- Within hours of the 22 June earthquake a convoy of WFP trucks had dispatched 170MT of high-energy biscuits for 2,600 households affected by the 22 June earthquake.
- WFP has suspended operations in Balkhab district of Sar-e-Pul province due to the imminent risk of armed conflict in the area. The suspension will impact nearly 2,700 households (18,900 people) during the month of June.
- WFP has switched 30 percent of its cash-based transfer caseload to in-kind food assistance between June and September, due to funding constraints for cash-based transfer programming.
- WFP is working to bolster warehouse capacity across all six Area Offices in preparation for the 2023 winter season. WFP requires USD 150 million to preposition 151,000 MT of food by November 2022 to feed 2.2 million people who are likely to be cut off during the winter (out of the 18 million planned to receive assistance during the harsh winter lean season) for five months.



Food and Nutrition Assistance

- General Food Assistance: WFP has assisted 4 **million** people with emergency food and nutrition support thus far in June. Of this total, more than **2.5 million** people received emergency food assistance in-kind, while 770,000 people were assisted via cash and value vouchers, and 574,000 people were assisted via commodity vouchers. Thus far in June, WFP has disbursed USD 14.9 million in cash-based assistance.
- Nutrition: In June, WFP has assisted 314,000 children (aged 6-59 months) and pregnant and lactating women (PLW) with nutritious foods to prevent cases of acute malnutrition, while treating 247,000 malnourished children and women. WFP currently supports 1,700 health centres and 316 mobile health and nutrition teams across the country to ensure continued and equitable access in hard-to-reach areas.
- School feeding: In June, WFP has distributed High Energy Biscuits (HEB) to 65,000 primary school students, including 25,500 primary school girls who also received take-home rations of vegetable oil. A total of 47,000 student have received daily rations of Bread+ this month. WFP has supported 2,000 of the planned secondary school girls with cash-based transfer incentives across four of the eight provinces currently allowing secondary level girls to attend school. WFP plans to further scale up assistance to secondary schoolgirls in the remaining four provinces, where possible.
- Asset creation and livelihoods: Thus far in June, WFP has assisted 40,100 people through food assistance for assets (FFA) and 19,000 through vocational skills training (VST). This month, WFP will conclude three VST projects assisting 2,000 people across five provinces. Over the course of six months, participants were trained in carpet weaving, embroidery, tailoring, and mobile phone repairs, as well as numeracy, literacy, and microbusiness development.



Supply Chain and Logistics

- In June, WFP dispatched 51,406 MT of mixed food commodities across Afghanistan, fulfilling approximately 54 percent of its monthly implementation plan thus far.
- In May, WFP-supported local millers produced a total 9,179 MT of fortified wheat flour, of which WFP procured 86 percent (7,887 MT) for humanitarian response. An additional 8,671 MT of non-fortified wheat flour was produced, of which 771 MT was procured by WFP, while the remaining 7,900 MT was produced for commercial markets.
- WFP is working to further strengthen milling, storage, and transport capacity in Pakistan to streamline expected commodity deliveries during the summer months.
- WFP is exploring options to support FAO, UNICEF, and WHO's requests for logistics and distribution support of agricultural inputs, WASH, and health supplies.



UN Humanitarian Air Service (UNHAS)

- UNHAS has conducted 1,715 flights in 2022 so far, transporting 11,445 passengers and 25 MT of essential cargo.
- UNHAS currently offers flights to 20 domestic destinations and two on demand, as well as three airbridges that connect Kabul to Islamabad, Dushanbe and Doha.

Resourcing Update

- WFP faces a net funding shortfall of USD 1.15 **billion** to sustain operations over the next 6 months (July-December 2022).
- WFP requires USD 150 million to preposition 151,000 MT of food commodities by November, ahead of the 2023 winter season.
- Food, nutrition and UNHAS requirements were included in the Global Humanitarian Overview and OCHA Flash Appeal for Afghanistan.
