

WFP PALESTINE EMERGENCY RESPONSE Situation Report 10

3 December 2023

HIGHLIGHTS

- Eight weeks into the war, there is a high risk of famine for all the people of Gaza, especially for those with chronic diseases, older persons, children, and those living with disabilities.
- During the 7-day humanitarian pause, WFP conducted wider-reaching assessments to inform our response and scaled-up its food assistance across Gaza. Our team began providing hot meals through partners and delivered in areas that had been hard to reach. WFP also used its expanded storage facilities to assist the dispatch of humanitarian cargo.
- Gaza's food system is on the brink of collapsing. Most shops are either shut down or have nearly empty shelves. Inflation is high as prices of essential food items have spiked while aid delivery has not been sufficient during the humanitarian pause to cater for the food and nutrition needs of people in Gaza.
- Humanitarian aid reaching Gaza through the Rafah border is the only lifeline, but additional crossing points are
 necessary to deliver at scale. WFP advocates for the safety of civilians as it impacts food security, safe and sustained
 humanitarian access and the resumption of commercial cargo.
- As needs are soaring, WFP requires a minimum of **USD 314 million** to sustain its emergency response for up to 1.1 million affected people until April 2024. The response is currently 30 percent funded.



Situation Update

• Food is the top priority in Gaza, followed by water. Hunger is spreading widely as people grow increasingly desperate in their search for bread and other essential foods. Cases of dehydration and malnutrition are increasing rapidly. People are resorting to skipping or reducing meals.

 WFP joined three inter-agency convoys during the humanitarian pause to deliver essential food assistance in areas hard to reach. People in these areas are experiencing increasingly alarming levels of hunger and deprivation as they had been cut off assistance and commercial activity for two months.

WFP Operations

General Food Assistance (GFA)

- During the 7-day pause, WFP reached an estimated 250,000 vulnerable people with in-kind and cashbased general food assistance across Gaza.
 - Around 142,000 internally displaced people (IDPs) in designated shelters received daily canned fava beans, high-energy biscuits, date bars and fresh bread sourced from one WFPcontracted bakery. An additional 40,000 displaced people in host communities received food parcels to support their food needs for 15 days.

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- WFP began distributing community-cooked hot meals to IDPs reaching more than 8,500 people with one hot meal over 2 days.
- Around 57,000 people redeemed their evouchers cash assistance across 82 shops in Gaza.
- Overall in November, 303,680 people in Gaza redeemed their food vouchers. However, 75 percent of WFP shops closed, ran out of food stocks, or have no connectivity to operate the assistance across Gaza. WFP is increasingly shifting to in-kind food assistance as no commercial imports have entered Gaza.
- Since the beginning of the escalation on 7 October, WFP reached 799,000 displaced people in Gaza, inside and outside UN shelters, with food and electronic food vouchers at shops. Overall, more than 856,000 people have been assisted in Gaza and the West Bank to date.

Supply Chain

- Currently, **146 WFP** trucks loaded with 1,800 mt of food parcels, date bars, canned fava beans and fortified biscuits are waiting to cross Rafah Border.
 Family food parcels contain canned beans, meat, chickpeas, halva, and date bars designed to meet 60 percent of a family's daily caloric needs for two weeks.
- In addition, WFP ships are currently arriving at Port Said with food commodities procured regionally from Egypt and Jordan, and globally to support WFP emergency response in Gaza.
- During the pause, around WFP 86 trucks with over 800 mt of food items crossed into Gaza and were immediately dispatched for distribution in coordination with cooperating partners. This brings the total number of WFP trucks to 178.

Clusters and Common Services

Logistics Cluster

- The Logistics Cluster installed three Mobile Storage Units (MSUs) at the Rafah Transhipment Base to increase the partners offloading capacity in Rafah with an additional 960 m². An additional 11 MSUs have been received in Gaza by the Logistics Cluster; and the team is assessing with partners in which key locations these should be installed.
- The Logistics Cluster launched common storage services in Port Said, Egypt, facilitating access to 800 pallets capacity to the humanitarian community. In addition, a cargo notification service in Rafah, Gaza Strip, will support partners with the reception of their cargo coming through the convoys.

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பீ Emergency Telecommunications Cluster <u>ETC</u>

- ETC urgently requires an initial USD 250,000 out of the total requested USD 800,000 in the Flash Appeal to continue ongoing activities in the Gaza response.
- ETC continues to work with partners to identify a corridor through which to import telecommunications equipment into Gaza and advocated for fuel for mobile operator sites.

B Funding

- WFP urgently requires at least US\$314 million in funding to provide support for up to 1.1 million people until April 2024.
- As of now, WFP has received US\$97.9 million in confirmed contributions: USD 89.1 million from government donors (Canada, EU, France, Germany (GFFO), Luxembourg, Malta, New Zealand, Norway, UAE, United States, Slovakia, Slovenia, Sweden, Switzerland, and CERF) and USD 8.8 million from the private sector including Share The Meal and Individual Giving campaigns.

Gaza Market Monitoring

- Most of the contracted shops are experiencing shortages of essential food items, such as wheat flour, eggs, dairy products, bottled water, and canned food. Field observations indicate availability of limited amounts of vegetables in the market. No commercial cargo has entered gas except cooking gas.
- WFP field observations indicate a substantial increase in the prices of essential food items since the beginning of the crisis. Wheat flour prices have surged by approximately 184 percent, salt by 433 percent, and sugar by 75 percent. The current commercial stocks of wheat flour are available for few days.

Accountability to Affected Populations

• WFP received approximately **68,330 calls** through the Inter-Agency community feedback mechanism (CFM) hotline, which provides a direct link between WFP and the affected population. Over **75 percent** of the calls requested food or cash assistance. Some 2,237 asked for shelter support.

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
