





WFP Afghanistan Situation Report

05 December 2022

In Numbers

Nearly 20 million people are projected to be acutely food-insecure between November 2022 and March 2023, including more than 6 million people in IPC Phase 4 (Emergency), according to preliminary estimates

4 million people are acutely malnourished, including 3.2 million children under the age of five

28.3 million people – two-thirds of Afghanistan's population – require multi-sectoral humanitarian assistance in 2023

Highlights

- In November, WFP surpassed 1 million mt of food distributed in 2022. WFP also disbursed more than US\$286.5 million worth of cash-based transfers.¹
- WFP has prepositioned 97,000 mt of food ahead of the winter lean season. WFP plans to preposition 100,000 mt to feed 1.5 million people in hard-to-reach areas for a period of five months.
- WFP urgently requires US\$1.46 billion to sustain operations through May 2023, to avoid catastrophic levels of hunger.
 Distributions may be interrupted if additional funds are not received in coming weeks.

Situation Update

- Nearly 20 million people in Afghanistan are acutely food-insecure (IPC 3+), including more than 6 million people on the brink of famine-likeconditions in IPC Phase 4 (Emergency), according to preliminary projections for November 2022 to March 2023.² Afghanistan continues to face the highest prevalence of insufficient food consumption globally.
- Female-headed households are disproportionately affected, as 96 percent are facing insufficient food consumption amid restrictions on women and girls. Female heads of household are twice as likely to sacrifice their meals so that their families can eat, compared to maleheaded households.
- Household debt has increased six-fold since 2019, and by 44 percent among urban households since 2021, as households struggle to meet their basic needs amidst economic crisis.
- The current food crisis is perpetuated by concurrent climate crisis, as 30 out of 34 provinces in Afghanistan report extremely low water quality. The proportion of households feeling the impact of drought in 2022 is six times greater than in 2020 as Afghanistan enters its third consecutive drought year.
- More than 28.3 million people will require humanitarian assistance in 2023, including 21.2 million in need of food and agriculture support, according to the 2023 Humanitarian Response Plan. Humanitarian partners plan to reach 23.7 million people with multi-sectoral assistance.

WFP Response

- In November, WFP has so far assisted 11.3 million people in Afghanistan with emergency food, nutrition, and livelihood support.
- Between January and October 2022, WFP reached 22.6 million people, cumulatively. To date, more than 1 million mt of food has been distributed in 2022, along with US\$286.5 million in cash-based transfers disbursed.
- To date, WFP has prepositioned more than 97,000 mt of food in hard-to-reach areas ahead of the winter season. WFP aims to preposition 100,000 mt to feed 1.5 million people for five months.
- In November, WFP hosted Afghanistan's Special Representative of the Secretary-General (SRSG) and other dignitaries on a visit to the WFP warehouse in Termez, Uzbekistan. A multi-functioning logistics hub for humanitarian assistance is set to open in Uzbekistan, which will serve as a regional humanitarian hub for UN operations in Afghanistan.
- WFP continues to support the World Health
 Organization (WHO) in the delivery of its deworming
 campaign in conjunction with WFP School Feeding
 activities. To date, 7 million out of the 9.7 million
 targeted students have received deworming
 medication.
- In November, the average price of basic food commodities decreased for the first time since March 2022. A 32 percent increase in the price of WFP's basic food basket was recorded in August 2022, compared to August 2021.

Food and Nutrition Assistance

- General Food Assistance: In November, WFP has so far assisted more than 10 million people with emergency food and nutrition support, including 6.6 million people with in-kind food assistance, 1.6 million people with direct cash or value vouchers, and more than 1.5 million people with commodity vouchers. In 2023, WFP aims to increase its use of cash-based transfer modalities in urban areas.
- Nutrition: In November, WFP provided specialized nutritious foods for the prevention of malnutrition to 570,180 pregnant and lactating women (PLW) and children aged 6-59 months, as well as treatment services to 370,000 women and children suffering from existing cases of malnutrition. WFP supports more than 2,200 health centers and 421 mobile health and nutrition teams (MHNTs) across the country to ensure continued and equitable access to nutrition assistance in hard-to-reach areas.
- School feeding: In November, WFP provided nutritious mid-day snacks to more than 887,000 primary school students. WFP also provided cash incentives to more than 9,560 secondary school girls in four provinces (Balkh, Jawzjan, Sar-e-Pul, and Zabul) where they are permitted to attend school.
- Asset creation and livelihoods: In November, WFP assisted more than 255,600 people through food assistance for assets (FFA) programming and more than 24,000 people through food assistance for training (FFT) activities. WFP also provided technical capacity support to 1,575 women through Smallholder Agriculture Market Support (SAMS) and FFA projects in Badakhshan and Takhar provinces. WFP seeks to enable more women to engage with Afghanistan's dairy value chain, from dairy cow

keeping to the processing and marketing of dairy products.





Supply Chain and Logistics

- In November, WFP dispatched 65,820 mt of mixed food commodities, representing 90 percent of its target.
- The first tranche of 30,000 mt of Ukrainian wheat designated for Afghanistan has been milled in Türkiye. WFP expects 18,000 mt to arrive via Pakistan in mid-December.



UN Humanitarian Air Service (UNHAS)

- UNHAS has conducted 4,014 flights in 2022 so far, transporting 29,093 passengers (18,358 on domestic and 7,735 on international flights), including transportation of 10 medevac patients and 54.5 mt of humanitarian light cargo (medical equipment, medicine vaccine, and office supply).
- UNHAS currently operates flights to 27 destinations -23 domestic destinations and four airbridges that connect Kabul to Islamabad, Dushanbe, Dubai, and Doha.

Resourcing Update

- In 2023, WFP requires US\$2.2 billion to deliver emergency food, nutrition, and livelihood support to those in need.
- WFP is currently facing a net funding shortfall of US\$1.46 billion to sustain operations over the next six months (December 2022-May 2023).
- WFP's needs are reflected in the 2023 Humanitarian Response Plan, which requires US\$4.62 billion to meet the prioritised, multi-sectoral needs of 23.7 million people.
